LEAVING A LASTING LEGACY

“The work of the Victory Services Club and its excellent staff, in supporting veterans of all wars, as well as serving personnel and their families, is very important to us.

Along with many people of our age, we have relatives who served in both World Wars. In their memory, we leave a legacy in our wills, with the hope that the club's valuable work will continue for many years to come.

In leaving this legacy to the Victory Services Club (which has the benefit of being tax efficient in terms of inheritance tax), we are making a donation to a worthwhile registered charity, whose facilities our family members have enjoyed for many years.”

HOW TO MAKE A LEGACY DONATION

A legacy is a great way of supporting the VSC, as it comes from assets, not income. It would not be at the expense of bequests to others, but rather in addition. Leaving a legacy to the Club may attract two significant tax benefits. The money you leave could be free from Inheritance Tax. Furthermore, if you leave at least 10% of your estate to charity, the tax rate on your remaining estate could be cut from 40% to 36%.*

There are various ways of remembering the VSC in your Will or a via a codicil (addition) to your existing Will:

- **Residuary:** where all, or a specified percentage, of the remainder of your estate after providing for family and others, would go to the Club.
- **Reversionary:** where you leave your assets to a beneficiary to make use of during their own lifetime, after which the assets, or a specified portion, reverts to the Trust.
- **Pecuniary:** a fixed sum of money. Specific: an item(s) or specified assets (e.g. land, shares, artwork).

YOUR LEGACY AT WORK

Legacies left to the VSC may be designated for any of our charitable activities, but our priority is to add them to our Respite & Welfare Fund to provide service personnel, and their family with a two-night stay at the Victory Services Club in London, inclusive of all meals and tickets to a London attraction.

These breaks offer an opportunity for individuals struggling with mental health concerns such as PTSD, stress, anxiety, depression or financial and personal hardship to take time away from their routine and focus on recovery. They also play a significant role in aiding physical recuperation from disabilities, or injuries in the line of duty.
